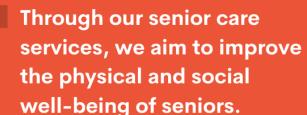
To help our seniors age in place, SNM Senior Care Centres (SCCs) provide a communal space for them to enjoy group activities while receiving essential care services.

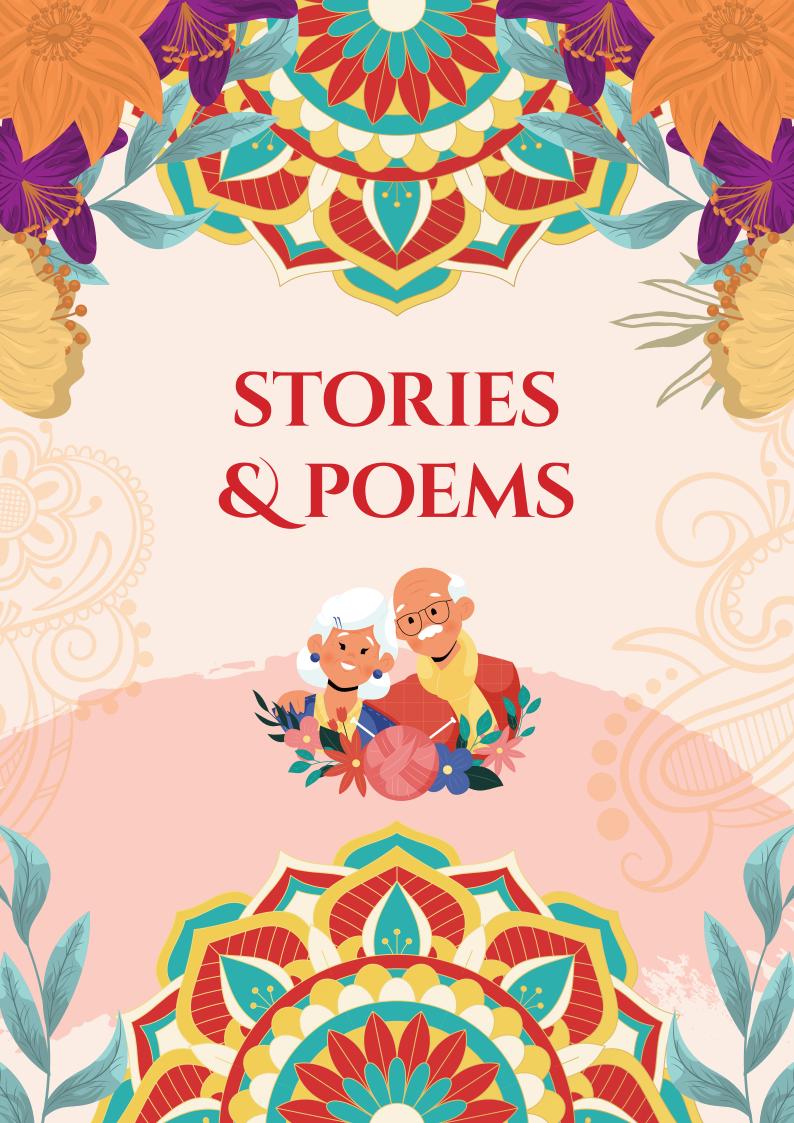

BRAHMASHREE NARAYANA GURU – THE DIVINE POWER OF COASTAL KARNATAKA

Sri Narayana Guru played a transformative role in reshaping the social and spiritual fabric of South India in the late 19th and early 20th centuries. Among the many milestones of his spiritual journey, one significant yet lesser-known chapter was his visit to Mangaluru in the early 20th century—a visit that left a lasting impact on the coastal region of Karnataka.

At a time when caste discrimination and social inequality were deeply entrenched, Sri Narayana Guru emerged as a beacon of reform. His teachings, which emphasised spiritual enlightenment, social equality, and education, began to inspire people far beyond Kerala.

Arrival in Mangaluru

Mangaluru, located along the scenic coastline of Karnataka, has long been known for its diverse communities and strong cultural ties with Kerala. Around 1912, Sri Narayana Guru visited Mangaluru, where he was warmly welcomed by the Billava community. His visit to Kudroli became a turning point in the socio-cultural history of the city.

Foundation of Sri Kudroli Gokarnanatha Temple

The most enduring legacy of his visit was the foundation of the Shree Gokarnanatha Kshetra, popularly known as Kudroli Temple, dedicated to Lord Shiva. Under Guru's guidance, the temple was built by the Billava community as a revolutionary step towards inclusivity—open to all, irrespective of caste or creed.



Guru himself consecrated the Shiva Linga at Kudroli Temple, boldly breaking orthodox traditions that restricted temple entry for certain communities. This act became a defining moment in the fight for social equality and self-respect for the marginalised.











Legacy in Mangaluru

Today, Kudroli Gokarnanatha Temple stands as a vibrant centre of faith and social harmony, embodying Guru's vision of equality and unity. The temple remains a symbol of empowerment for the Billava community and countless others who draw inspiration from his teachings.

Mangaluru Dasara, celebrated at the Kudroli Gokarnanatheshwara Temple, has grown into one of the grandest festivals of Coastal Karnataka. The Navaratri festivities feature elaborate rituals, cultural programmes, and vibrant tableaux processions (Shobha Yatre) depicting mythological themes. The temple and city are illuminated magnificently, attracting thousands of devotees and tourists each year.

Mangaluru continues to honour Guru's contributions, especially during Sri Narayana Guru Jayanthi, when organisations celebrate his ideals of service, education, and progress. The Sri Narayana Guru Circle in Mangaluru, a prominent city landmark, stands as a tribute to his legacy. During a recent visit, Prime Minister Narendra Modi paid floral respects to Guru at this circle before addressing an election rally, acknowledging his immense social and cultural contributions to the region.



Sri Narayana Guru's visit to Mangaluru was more than a historical event—it was a spiritual awakening that redefined social justice and harmony in Coastal Karnataka. His legacy continues to inspire generations, reminding us of the power of equality, unity, and collective progress.

The Government of Karnataka has officially recognised Narayana Guru Jayanthi as a state celebration, honouring the revered saint and social reformer known for his message of "One Caste, One Religion, One God for Humanity." The state commemorates the occasion with cultural events, seminars, and awareness programmes that highlight Guru's enduring contributions to social equality, education, and spiritual upliftment.

None of this would have been possible without the tireless support of Mrs. Sarojam, our Members' Secretariat. In an ever-changing world, one constant has quietly endured for over five decades: the unwavering spirit of Guru Dharma Society. Established on the bedrock of Sree Narayana Guru's profound teachings — "One caste, one religion, one God for humankind" — this society has grown from modest beginnings into a powerful force for compassion, unity, and service in Malaysia's Klang Valley. What began as a heartfelt initiative by a group of like-minded, service-oriented Malayalee friends has evolved into a tax-exempt charitable organisation that continues to light the way for the underserved and forgotten. Their founding vision - to pass down the teachings of Sree Narayana Guru to future generations while promoting love, unity, and humanity through meaningful action.

Built on Faith, Run on Trust

From the beginning, the Society was anchored by strong leadership and sound governance laid down by its founding members. Their commitment ensured that integrity and community focus remained the cornerstones of its work.

Crucially, Guru Dharma Society has always operated through the generosity of others. Fundraising efforts, kind-hearted sponsors, and the unwavering support of the public have enabled every programme, outreach, and initiative to take shape — and make a difference.

The Spirit of Service

At the heart of Guru Dharma Society lies a timeless principle:

"Service to humanity is service to God."

Inspired by Sree Narayana Guru's emphasis on equality, education, and compassion, the Society began its journey of outreach by addressing the community's most urgent needs: health and healing.

Through monthly medical clinics, serving an average of 30 people each week, and a fully equipped mobile medical unit, the Society has brought essential healthcare directly to underserved communities and villages. These efforts include medical check-ups, cancer awareness programmes for cervical and breast cancer, and vital treatments such as dental and eye care. Over the years, this commitment has delivered healing and hope to hundreds of seniors and families who might otherwise have been left behind by mainstream services.

















But healthcare alone is not enough. Recognising that education is the key to breaking cycles of poverty, the Society launched tuition support programmes and higher education sponsorships. Since 2009, its Back2School initiative has equipped over 500 children with school uniforms and supplies, nurturing self-confidence and renewed motivation by various experts. The results speak volumes: today, 22 families have moved out of poverty, with their children graduating with degrees and diplomas, proof of what care, opportunity, and belief can achieve. We even have two students who were on the Deen's list, one in University of Malaya and another in Open University Malaysia.

In addition, to build confidence, resilience, and focus on children from socially challenged backgrounds, we collaborated with various organisations, such as the police force, and introduced activities like mind games, rock climbing programmes, and the three-day GADIS camp for girls to provide them with a holistic character-building education.

Sustaining Lives, **Nourishing Souls**

Since 2004, the Society's monthly food ration programme, consistently worth approximately RM30,000 a year, has supported 30 families. More than



meals, these packages bring dignity, stability, nutrition, and peace of mind to households living at the edge of survival.

Beyond physical sustenance, Guru Dharma Society also uplifts spirits.

Our **annual festive celebrations** — engaging over 850 underprivileged children and 98 senior citizens -create moments of joy, inclusion, and emotional connection. These events are not merely celebrations; they are reminders that no one is forgotten.























Preserving Culture and Building Community

Guru Dharma Society is not just a charitable organisation, it is a living cultural and spiritual community. Over the decades, members have championed rich traditions of performance, sport, and reflection. During the annual Chathayam **celebrations** (marking the birth anniversary of Sree Narayana Guru), the Society has brought the Guru's teachings to life through drama and stage productions — many crafted by passionate past Presidents and Vice Presidents in the 1980s and 90s.

From tele-matches to badminton tournaments, community sports events were organised not just for competition, but for camaraderie — creating memories that united generations in joy and shared purpose.

A Place to Call Home

From humble beginnings in borrowed venues, the Society has now established a **permanent home** - a vibrant centre for operations, family days, cultural programmes, spiritual discourses, and community dialogues. More than just a building, this space is a sanctuary of connection, growth, and shared values.

Chathayam Spirituality, Community and Charity

This chapter is extracted from The Sree Narayana Mission (Singapore) by Loh Kah Seng

One of the landmark events of any SNM year is the annual Chathayam celebrations, named after the star of the same name in the Malayalam calendar. As Sree Narayana Guru is believed to have been born under this star, his followers have adopted the day of Chathayam as his birthday. In Singapore, as in Kerala, Chathayam is a keenly anticipated and warmly celebrated festival of the Malayalee community. It is held in the month of *Chingam* (usually August or September). It also falls on the fourth day of Onam, the harvest festival celebrated by Malayalees.

In recent years, Chathayam has been renamed Guru Jayanti. However here, in tracing its social history and cultural heritage, we will use its old name.

Women and the Chathayam Lunch

Traditionally, the highlight of the Chathayam celebrations was a social lunch at SNM called *Onam Sadya* (a vegetarian feast). This has been a major event with a deep cultural significance for the members. R Asokan believed that the lunch started in 1972, the year he joined the Mission when he was still doing his National Service. ⁶⁷ At the time, SNM was recruiting younger members like him. The Chathayam lunch was a significant event in its own right, an experience for the members. Part of this was due to the serving of

a large number of traditional vegetarian dishes from Kerala, possibly 26 items in all. They were served in a certain order. Some of these dishes were aviyal, theeyal, thoran, pachadi, sambar, pappadam, parippu, mango pickles, ginger achar, lemon achar, rasam, moru, banana chips, sarakra puratti, and four types of payasam.⁶⁸

Historically, the making of the lunch was an all-women's affair. In the earlier days, families would prepare the different food items in their homes and bring them to the Mission. However, as time went by, they paid money for the dishes to be prepared at the Mission. For many of SNM's women volunteers, their preparations for the lunch were indeed the real festival. As Prasanna Dayanandan related, there was a genuine 'festival mood' as the cooks and helpers went about their work. ⁶⁹ The way the women divided the preparation and cooking has become part of the social memory of SNM. It is a women's history reflecting the spirit of volunteerism among the female members.

There were two chief cooks: Dayanandan and Radhadevi Vijayan. Other women like Sunanda Senan were given special roles such as purchasing specific grocery items in large quantities and bringing them to the SNM premises to be cooked. This sounded simple but in practice, the sheer quantity made it a manpower and logistical challenge.

Preparations such as the cutting of vegetables would begin in the morning of the day and the cooking starts at ten the night before and continues into the early morning. By noon, the lunch would be cooked and ready to be served to about a 1000 guests.







Vijayan was in charge of cooking lentil curry (parippu), the first dish served with rice, while Dayanandan made the sambar. Indira Damodaran was responsible for a vegetarian dish called pachadi, served with bitter gourd, other vegetables and yogurt. She would cook it in a large pot at home and then bring it to the Mission Office. Though the work was demanding, it was 'a real thrill' for the women to work together as a team, as remembered by Vasanthi Pillai, who helped cut the vegetables.

Renewing the Mission

The lunch was historically the centrepiece of a series of spiritual and socio-cultural activities during Chathayam. Disciples of the Guru from Kerala sometimes came to speak to the members, while High Commissioners from India were also oft-invited guests. The members put up a cultural show which included *kathakali* performance, a form of traditional play from Kerala with song, music and dance, in addition to participating in the sports and games. Among the latter, musical chairs and tug of war were crowd favourites. This was naturally so for the children and youth, but adults also took the competition surprisingly seriously.

The presence of the young and old signalled Chathayam's importance as a family and intergenerational event. It was key to the renewal of the Mission's membership in the long run. Syamala Senan regularly brought her young daughter Anusha to the celebrations. Later, Anusha began volunteering with the Mission as a young adult, organising activities for the youth before joining the Executive Committee. She also became a follower of the Guru. Although Anusha's childhood memory of Chathayam was that of 'a huge party,' the event had a deeper significance for her as a volunteer.⁷⁵

SNM's arts section organised cultural shows and entertainment for the members, often during Chathayam. The big hall and stage at 48 Soon Keat Road, with a capacity of 500, had been built for this purpose. The shows were duly documented by the Ministry of Culture, from which the Mission had to obtain entertainment licences. The scripts of the shows were also vetted. According to Krishnan Vasu, the performances were held in the hall, while the sports and games during Chathayam took place in the vast area outside that could accommodate hundreds of people. ⁷⁶

Inside the hall, Malayalam dramas were popular with audiences, while the use of Malayalam reinforced the cultural identity of SNM members. The During the Chathayam celebrations in 1969, the SNM Library presented a dramatic re-enactment of the traditional Malayalee boat race, 'Vallam Kali'. The 1972 programme included three days of pooja followed by dance, music and devotional songs. The Malayalam play, 'Thulaabharam', was staged during the celebrations two years later. In August 1977, SNM presented the Malayalam drama 'Vishamavirtham', which was hailed as 'a great success'. In 1980, the play, 'Neelakkadambu',

based on a novel, was performed at 48 Soon Keat Road, 82 while the Malayalam drama, 'Sabdan', was staged at the Victoria Theatre the following year. 83

Wider Engagements

Chathayam was also an official occasion, allowing SNM to showcase its growing social services in the wider community. Government officials

graced the event as Guests of Honour (GOH) and invited guests. Their speeches frequently lauded both Malayalee culture as an exemplary form of multiculturalism and the Mission's contributions to Singapore society. In past years, Chinese and Malay drama groups also performed during Chathayam.84 These broader engagements made the celebrations doubly meaningful to the members.







School students were a fixture in the festival, sharing the stage with members and government officials. In 1970, students from Parry Secondary School performed a multiracial show at the start of the celebrations. This was followed by the presentation of SNM scholarships to students of different ethnic backgrounds by Mohd Ghazali Ismail, the Parliamentary Secretary at the Ministry of Education (MOE). The Mission then made its own presentation that was the keys to an ambulance donated by Chor Yeok Eng, Ismail's counterpart at the Ministry of Health (MOH).

The next item that day was what was reported to be a 'very stimulating forum' on 'The Conflict of Generations'. This involved academics and public officials, namely, Dr Gwee Ah Eng, G G Thomson, Gerald D'Cruz and Dr Nalla Tan. ⁸⁵ The celebrations of 1970 alone signified the triple ideals of SNM: spirituality, community and charity.

Seven years later, the Chathayam celebrations took place between 29 August and 4 September, after National Day. Another forum with a social theme was held on 'Developing Welfare Programmes for the Youth and the Aged in our Community.' Don Mathews, the Welfare Officer and Chair of the forum's organising committee, explained why it was necessary to understand and tackle Singapore's major youth problems, such as school dropouts and drug abuse. The event reportedly drew an audience of 300.⁸⁶ There was a public meeting after the lunch, with SNM members Joe Chellam and George Netto speaking in English and Malayalam, respectively.⁸⁷

Matters of Religion and Language

Besides Chathayam, the Mission was actively involved in promoting racial and religious harmony in other ways – values that were also promoted by the Singapore government. In 1977, when SNM celebrated the International Sree

Narayana Guru Year, it organised a discussion on the Guru's teachings. A public forum on the major religions in Singapore was also held that year. Various experts spoke: Venerable Mangala Thera on Buddhism, Abdul Rauf bin Fauzal Hassan on Islam and A Janardhanan on Christianity.⁸⁸

SNM also organised night classes for English, Hindi and Malayalam for the members' children. Various pioneer teachers who volunteered their time and expertise have received recognition for this, such as N Peethambaram, V Vasu Pilla, Perinattu Kunjuraman, and P Sambasivan, whose names were recorded in the 1956 Building *Inauguration Souvenir.* 89 The Malayalam classes were taught by volunteer teachers five days a week from 6.30 p.m. to 8 p.m. Vasanthi Pillai recalled that when she was in primary school, her brother and she studied Malayalam at 48 Soon Keat Road. This was their mother tongue which their mother felt was important for Malayalees to learn. 90 The SNM Library had Malayalam textbooks for Standards 1 to 5.91

The Malayalam classes were historically interesting because they reflected the initiative and self-help of the Malayalee community. Malayalam was not made an official second language in Singapore, yet it was, according to Anitha Devi Pillai, 'the binding force of the community', widely used before Singapore became independent. As we have seen, Malayalam stage shows were still popular in the 1970s and 1980s. Malayalee organisations such as the Narayana Gurukula (also nearby in Chong Pang Village), the Kerala Association and SNM strove to keep the language alive by offering free classes. However, Malayalee children were growing up learning another second language in school like Tamil or Malay.

In this context, SNM's Malayalam classes, though well-remembered, were not successful.

Attendances were low. Most parents did not see any practical value sending their children there. In 1977, many parents asked the Mission to include the Guru's teachings in the Malayalam classes to make them more relevant. The outgoing Executive Committee thought that the next committee might propose this to the Narayana Gurukula, whose classes SNM could subsidise. 93

Unlike the Mission, the Gurukula was dedicated solely to the study of the Guru's teachings. It seemed to have been a rival spiritual organisation, though it was not involved in socio-cultural or charitable activities. The following year, SNM decided to include the Guru's teachings in its own Malayalam classes instead. They were conducted by Vinodini Menon, who was a 'qualified and experienced teacher.'94 In the 1980s, however, the use of Malayalam in Singapore declined. 95

Historically, the Chathayam celebrations fulfilled the spiritual and socio-cultural functions for SNM. The primary function was that it was an occasion for the Guru's followers to reaffirm their adherence to his teachings each year. It also enabled them to meet fellow Malayalees, maintaining their ethnic ties and identity. Furthermore, Chathayam affirmed the Mission's commitment to the wider cause of charity in Singapore. It was at once an event for the Guru's followers, the members of the

Malayalee community and the government's 'Many Helping Hands' policy. It showcased the balance of spirituality, community and charity at SNM.

MY FATHER... PORAVANKARA NARAYANAN NAIR

Founding Leader of NBKL

Unionist, poet, stage actor, writer ... and my father



I was a mummy's boy, the first male child after five sisters. You can imagine the treatment I got at home. I was a princeling, with every need and want taken care of by my mother and sisters. My father was busy with his work as a storekeeper in the former British Naval Base in Sembawang. He had very little time for the family as he was involved in extra-curricular activities like acting in dramas, writing poems, and taking part in union work.

Literature was his passion. He would sit on the balcony, smoking incessantly and writing poems and short stories in Malayalam, our mother tongue. He got his work published in newspapers in Kerala. He spent endless nights with his friends analysing and critiquing the works of literary figures like Vallathol and Vaikkom Muhamed Basheer, 'Mathilukal' was Basheer's celebrated novel about a convict who starts a conversation with a lady prisoner whom he can't see because of a wall that separates them.

I was a bystander, absorbing everything they argued about. I was somewhat clueless about the people they talked about. But the names of those two literary greats stuck, and as I moved from childhood to adulthood, I made it a point to watch 'Mathilukal'. I became a movie addict.

Nearly every Saturday, I would go to the Canberra Theatre in the Naval Base with my father and on the walk back home, we would discuss the movie - the actors, the plot, and how realistic the movie was. Realism was his common theme.

Bhanumathi was his favourite actress as her films didn't portray women as powerless human beings toiling their lives away in the kitchen. He liked Sivaji Ganesan but was critical of his overacting. MGR's movies were too unrealistic.

The memory of my father came back to me when I watched a Malayalam film in Kerala recently. 'Ullozhukku' is a tale of the relationship between a mother-in-law and a daughter-in-law. They live the lie they had told each other, one about her son's serious illness to get him married, the other about her affair before marriage. I would have loved to hear his views on who was more culpable. I am quite sure he wouldn't want to be drawn into that aspect as it was too obvious. Instead, he would talk about how and why the family continued to live in a water-logged house, and the message that it was sending to movie-goers. That was the man he was. Always looking for that unique aspect and investigating it in depth.









Malayali fathers of yore never expressed their love openly. They felt their duty was to make sure the family was provided for. My father did that, he gave my mother the weekly brown envelope and left it to her to run the home.

Call it osmosis, DNA, or something else, I took on some of his traits; became interested in writing, started out as a journalist, developed a rebellious trait, started watching Malayalam movies in earnest, developed a love for the language and for Kerala. The other day, I realised that I walked like him, with both hands at the back, one holding the other. That was his trademark.

He retired in the late 1960s, with gratuity in hand and a thousand thoughts and advice in his head. His friends told him to put the money in the bank, rent a home, and live off the interest. I was adamant that he should buy a house and become a property owner, a great dream of his. I'm glad that he listened to me. We were also fortunate that he retired at the right time, as those who stayed on had their gratuity kept for them in a

deal between Lee Kuan Yew and the union. The rationale was that the money, if paid in full, would be spent quickly. Instead, the money would be given to them in instalments.

His retirement was the worst thing that happened to him. Many of his close friends had left for India or England. I could feel the pain of his loneliness and listlessness. Even in that late stage of his life, he was showing me silently to have a retirement plan.

He passed on in 1987. I shed no tears because I knew he had lived a meaningful life.

I wish I had more time with him.

Ageism

As we commemorate another milestone in our Sree Narayana Mission (SNM)'s journey, let us reflect on an important yet often overlooked issue: ageism. Ageism means treating people unfairly or judging them based on their age. For many older adults, these attitudes are all too familiar and can have a lasting impact.

What Is Ageism?

Ageism includes negative stereotypes and unfair treatment based on age, such as leaving older adults out of opportunities, assuming they cannot understand technology, or overlooking their opinions. Sometimes, ageism is subtle; being overly protective or using patronising language. It can influence not only how others view older people, but also how older adults might see themselves (Burnes et al., 2020; North & Fiske, 2021).

The Realities Faced by Older Adults

Today's older adults are active, healthy, and crucial contributors to families and communities, with people aged over 50 remaining an important part of the workforce in many countries (Ng & Feldman, 2021). Yet discrimination still happens, leading to situations such as:

- Seniors are being passed over for job opportunities.
- Limited access to workplace training.
- · Early retirement is forced upon older workers, even when they are capable and willing to contribute.

Such discrimination can result in financial stress, social isolation, and a loss of confidence (Rudman & Aldrich, 2021).

Ageism in Singapore and Canada: **Lessons Learned**

In both Singapore and Canada, ageism is a lived challenge, though it appears in different forms. In Singapore, strong cultural values around filial piety support elders at home, but do not always prevent workplace age discrimination or negative assumptions. In Canada, while legal protections exist, older adults may still encounter stereotypes that limit their participation (Ng & Feldman, 2021; Government of Canada, 2024). The common thread is that, regardless of culture, age-based barriers and anxieties about retirement or re-employment are widespread.

Building an Age-Friendly Society

To combat ageism and support everyone's dignity, our community can:

- · See the Whole Person: Engage with older adults as equals and avoid making assumptions about abilities.
- Encourage Lifelong Learning: Support ongoing education and hobbies, emphasizing that learning is for all ages (Maulod & Lu, 2020).
- Promote Flexible Opportunities: Advocate for flexible work schedules and volunteer roles that accommodate caregivers and those transitioning into retirement.
- Foster Intergenerational Connections: collaborate, break down stereotypes, and share experiences (Firzly et al., 2021).
- Highlight Positive Aging: Share stories of vibrant seniors and promote images that challenge ageist stereotypes.







The Power of Community

At the heart of SNM's mission is a simple yet powerful belief: everyone deserves dignity, opportunity, and a sense of belonging. Age should never be a reason someone is left behind, overlooked, or underestimated. In fact, our shared experiences across generations are what truly enrich our communities.

In a fast-changing world where older adults may face financial uncertainties, social isolation, or workplace discrimination, community becomes a vital resource. It is within communities that attitudes can shift, solidarity can grow, and meaningful change can take root. When older and younger generations engage, listen to each other, and collaborate, we build bridges—not walls—across age divides.

Role of Sree Narayana Mission (SNM)

Community organisations like SNM play a critical role in making this vision a reality. Through intergenerational outreach, elder empowerment programmes, and persistent advocacy, we are sowing the seeds of a more compassionate and inclusive society. Whether it is through supporting eldercare workers, hosting public dialogues, or equipping older adults with digital skills, SNM works every day to foster connections that matter.

It is time for all of us, families, employers, schools, and policymakers, to recognise the immense value that older adults bring and actively work to create environments where they are seen, heard, and empowered.

Let us remember:

"Age is not a barrier but a bridge. By crossing it together, we build a future that honours every stage of life."

As we celebrate Guru Jayanthi 2025, may this commitment to age inclusion continue to guide our actions and inspire our shared future.

ONENESS OF HUMANITY: UNIVERSAL VALUES AS TAUGHT BY REVERED SREE NARAYANA GURU

On 7th Sep 2025, Sree Narayana Mission, Singapore (SNM) will celebrate, Revered Sree Narayana Guru's 171st Birth Anniversary. In conjunction with the anniversary celebrations, SNM plans to organize an interfaith dialogue on the theme, "Oneness of Humanity".

The theme for the Interfaith Dialogue, is inspired by Verse 2 of Jati Nirnayam (Ascertainment of Caste), a profound composition by Sree Narayana **Guru**. The first line of this verse is widely quoted as encapsulating the essence of the Guru's teachings. These words are prominently displayed in many institutions shaped by his life and message.

This article will explore in depth the meaning of Verse 2 of Jati Nirnayam

ഒരു ജാതി ഒരു മതം ഒരു ദൈവം മനുഷ്യന് ഒരു യോനിയൊരാകാരമൊരു ഭേദവുമില്ലതില്.

English Transliteration of Verse Oru jaati, oru matam, oru Daivam manushyanu Oru yoni, oraakaaram oru bhedavum illatil.

English Translation One in kind, One in faith, One in God is man, Of one womb, of one form Difference herein is none.

Background

To understand this verse, it is important to consider the historical context in which the Guru lived. Born in 1856 and living until 1928, he spent most of his life in what is now the state of Kerala in South India. At that time, casteism was deeply entrenched. Social discrimination based on caste was rampant: lower castes were denied access to education, confined to menial jobs, denied entry into places of worship, and treated as

untouchables. Caste was strictly hereditary, and children of the lower castes were subjected to the same treatment as their parents.

Sree Narayana Guru himself was born into a caste that enjoyed some privileges such as access to education and trade but was still excluded from mainstream temple worship and looked down upon by the upper castes.

From a young age, the Guru demonstrated a keen intellect and spiritual inclination. He excelled in his studies and began questioning many social customs and practices he felt were unjust. By the time he was a young adult, he had become proficient in Sanskrit and was known as an **Asan (teacher)**. His reading of scriptures and Vedic texts, combined with guidance from self-realized spiritual masters, deepened his understanding of universal truths. He came to the realization that discrimination is a man-made construct—in the realm of ultimate truth, all beings are One.

True realization, the Guru taught, can only come through intense contemplation on the nature of truth. Through deep meditation in solitude, he attained self-realization.

Following his enlightenment, Guru devoted himself to the **upliftment of the oppressed.** He encouraged education, established schools, promoted self-respect through temple worship, founded vocational centers, and spread the message of Oneness of Humanity through poems, philosophical writings, and teachings to the common people.







Let us now delve in detail; on Verse 2.

"One in Kind"

Human beings have an innate tendency to gravitate towards what is familiar. When faced with differences—whether in appearance, speech, customs, or behaviour—we often distance ourselves. This instinct, when exploited for self-interest, becomes the seed of discrimination, and eventually gives rise to systems like caste. Over time, such systems were falsely justified through misinterpretations of scriptures. This was the social climate in which the Guru grew up.

Sree Narayana Guru strongly opposed these divisions. He would sit and eat with those labelled "untouchables," challenging the prevailing notion that doing so would "pollute" a person of a higher caste. He famously said that he felt no different after sharing a meal with them. Upon attaining enlightenment, he firmly rejected the upper-caste argument that the scriptures mandated castebased discrimination.

Guru offered a scientific and rational basis for the unity of humankind. He asked: What justifies dividing humans into different castes or classes? Just as cows are categorized as bovines, humans belong to one species. If a man and woman produce offspring, they belong to the same KIND. To differentiate humans based on intellect, skin colour, language, geography, or customs is arbitrary and fundamentally flawed. Therefore, any other classification of humans is baseless.

"One in Faith"

The Sanskrit word for religion or faith is Matam, which literally means the opinion of the wise.

Faith, in this context, refers to teachings and paths created by enlightened beings—such as the Buddha, Jesus Christ, Prophet Muhammad, and many seers and sages—who, out of deep compassion, guided humanity towards inner happiness. This happiness should not be confused with happiness that we derive from materialism which is transient. This everlasting happiness is the peace that arises from recognizing the Oneness in all.

Since all faiths ultimately aim at this same inner happiness, they are essentially One in purpose. Ranking religions or arguing over their superiority is both meaningless and destructive. Religious conflict defies the very purpose of religion, which is to bring peace and understanding.

"One in God"

All religions teach the existence of one Supreme Being. Sree Narayana Guru emphasized that Hinduism is monotheistic—that the One God is represented through many forms and deities. In protest against caste-based temple exclusions, Guru consecrated temples where everyone could worship, affirming both spiritual equality and human dignity. In some temples, he even consecrated mirrors instead of idols, symbolizing that God resides within each of us.

Across all religions, God is described as **omnipresent, omnipotent, formless, and eternal.** It follows, then, that this **God is One and the Same** for all. Hence, the phrase **"One in God".**

"Of One Womb"

To dispel any remaining doubts about human oneness, the Guru reminds us that **all humans**







are born from the mother's womb. If we consider the collective womb as the source of all life. it becomes evident that all human beings share a common origin. Yet, during the journey of life, we forget this shared beginning-and in the end, everyone returns to the same earth.

"Of One Form"

If doubts persist, one only needs to observe that all human beings-regardless of race, nationality, or background—share the same basic form. Man and woman, from any part of the world, belong to the same kind.

7. "Difference Herein Is None"

From a scientific, rational, and spiritual standpoint, it is clear that humankind is one. Thus, any division based on intellect, social status, race, or nationality is both irrational and unjust.

If someone disagrees, Guru advises self-inquiry. Each person must introspect and seek truth on their own terms. If their conclusion leads to lasting inner peace and harmony, regardless of external conditions, then that person has attained selfrealization. And this is the way of the Guru.

The highest tribute we can offer to Revered Sree Narayana Guru is to earnestly study his teachings, grasp their essence, and embody them in our daily lives. In doing so, we cultivate harmony both within ourselves and in the world around us.
